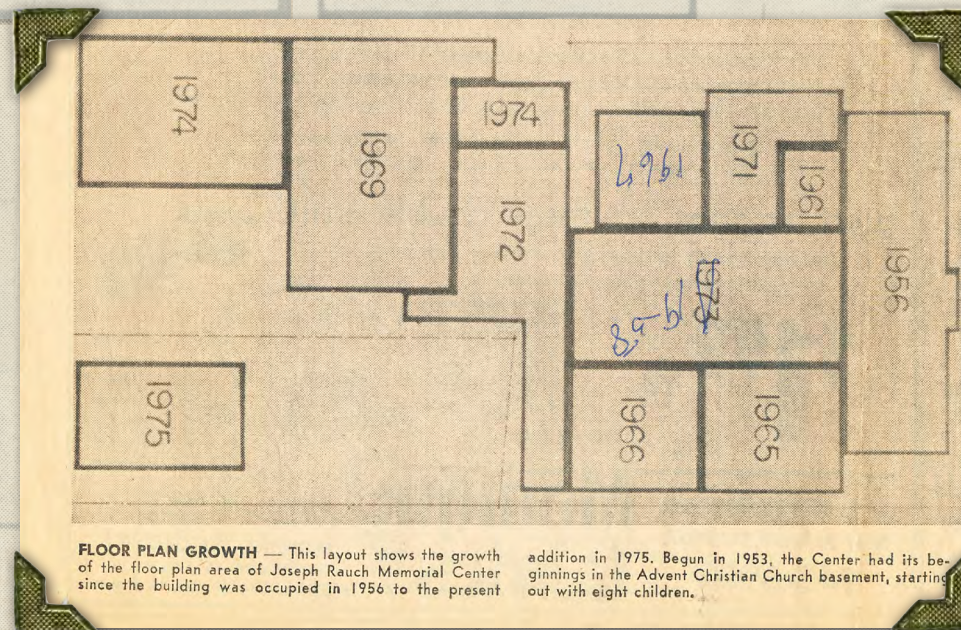

# 2012-2013 Program Outcome Highlights

## ACCESS

ACCESS is a day program for adults with disabilities. Participants enjoy full-day and half-day trips to local museums, attractions, parks, and retail establishments. Small group and one-on-one community activities help strengthen the participant's ties to the community and give them the opportunity to speak and act on their own behalf.

### Outcomes:

60% of group outings were used to perform a volunteer activity.  
100% of stakeholders rated services as satisfactory.  
90% of program objectives were met at the minimum level or above.

## Adult Developmental Activities (ADA)

ADA is a day program for adults with disabilities designed for those who have been diagnosed with significant physical, mental and/or behavioral disabilities. ADA clients participate in activities to build skills including creating artwork, learning daily living skills, and establishing good behaviors. One of their rewarding activities includes making beautiful works of art at The Studio at Fairmont Neighborhood Center.

### Outcomes:

100% of stakeholders rated services as satisfactory.  
100% of program objectives were met at the minimum level or above.  
A monthly newsletter was produced and distributed to families, and 69% of families received 10 or more one-on-one contacts over the year.  
Celebrations were held for numerous occasions including holidays, birthdays, and anniversaries.

## Children's Services

Children learn and develop best through play experiences. This philosophy has guided Rauch's family-centered children's services since 1953. Choosing a Rauch provider for your child's early intervention needs ensures that your therapist meets the highest level of professional standards. Rauch works to support your child socially, emotionally, physically, and mentally, and offers such a wide variety of services including speech, physical, occupational and developmental therapy.

### Outcomes:

100% of parents rated services as satisfactory.  
100% of program objectives were met at or above the goal level, with 86% at optimum level.  
80.75% of children showed at least a 4-item gain from pre-test to post-test.

## Employment Services

Employment Services programming provides placement services to clients with disabilities and other life challenges. Clients obtain and maintain community-based employment through career explorations, job readiness, soft skills training, job development, follow along services, and individual job coaching.

### Outcomes:

Clients averaged 61 days (decreased from 89 days in 2012) from intake to job placement.  
More than 88% of clients placed retained employment at least 180 days.  
100% satisfaction rating.  
82% of program objectives were met at minimum level or above.

## Healthy Families

Healthy Families is a no-cost, voluntary parent support program designed to help families who are expecting or have just had a baby adjust to parenthood. Rauch accomplishes this by providing support, encouragement and information to families who choose to participate in services.

### Outcomes:

91% of participating families had no CPS reports.  
72% of program objectives were met at the minimum level or above.



## Did you know?

Rauch is named for Rabbi Joseph Rauch, an original WHAS Crusade for Children panelist and early supporter. Rabbi Rauch and founder Leona Receveur had tremendous respect for one another, and we're proud to still bear his name.

## Rauch Industries

Rauch Industries, a division of Rauch, Inc., offers work opportunities in a safe and structured environment, while providing a valuable service to the business community. Rauch Industries offers an integrated workplace that employs people with and without disabilities. Work Services staff address clients' needs and ensure individual planning occurs in an open, friendly, and organized manner. Rauch, Inc. Landscaping & Lawn Care is a service line of Rauch Industries.

### Outcomes:

99.8% of contracts met customer deadlines.  
The defect rate for contract work was 0.0083%.  
67% of work services program objectives met at minimum or above.  
No client surveys required corrective action.  
25 new clients began working at Rauch Industries, a total of 49 new clients in the past 2 years.

## Supported Living

Rauch Supported Living services helps individuals with disabilities find a home in their income range, offers financial guidance, teaches daily living skills, provides transportation and helps plan recreational activities. Clients who are eligible for this program must be on the Autism, Traumatic Brain Injury, or Developmental Disabilities Waiver. In FY 2013, Supported Living began construction on its third set of four homes at Hawthorn Glen subdivision in Clark County, each serving three clients, for a total capacity of 36.

### Outcomes:

92% of program objectives were met at the minimum level or above.  
68% of client goals were met.  
Clients participated in an average of 55 social and/or recreational activities.  
No client or stakeholder surveys required corrective action.

## Interpreting Services

Rauch Interpreting Services has contracts with over 40 certified professional interpreters to serve the needs of individuals in our community who are deaf and hard of hearing. Interpreting and translation services are also available for some foreign languages.

### Outcomes:

100% satisfaction among businesses, deaf and hard of hearing & world language customers.  
An average of 1,242 hours were interpreted per quarter.  
8 professional development workshops were offered for interpreters.

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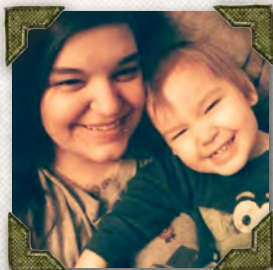

## John Finds Fulfillment

When Rauch Employment Services first encountered John, he was very quiet and seemed guarded. At first glance, he was a little intimidating.

John wanted to work in food service. He became more trusting of his Employment Consultant (EC) and began sharing information about his interests and dreams, including that he enjoys photography and would like to eventually become a chef. Not originally from the area, John was isolated in that he did not know anyone but his family.

A new Bob Evans was opening in New Albany, and they were hiring. John and his EC prepared for the interview by reviewing potential questions and answers. He was very eager and willing to work with her on this process.

On the way to the interview, John was nervous, but excited. He had been out of work a few years and had little success in getting interviews. This time was different - he was offered a position as a prep cook and gladly accepted. John was disappointed about just one thing... he would no longer see his EC after he was stable in his job.

John arrived to work his first day early and motivated. After being on the job a short while, he started making friends. He was soon acknowledged by his supervisors for his good work. John volunteers for overtime and has now been cross-trained for other positions. He recently got a raise, and was told that he would likely be eligible for another pay increase soon. The job has been good for him in other ways, too - he has lost so much weight that he is going to have to use some of that raise to buy new clothing! He carries himself with a sense of pride that he lacked when he arrived at Rauch, which is possibly the best part of his success.



## Interpreting Vital Information

Rauch Interpreting Services was contracted to provide services during medical appointments for Tom, a deaf man diagnosed with lung cancer. When it came time for surgery, Tom requested that Dave Calvert, Rauch's Director of Interpreting Services, be his interpreter for the pre- and post-operative sessions. Tom told the hospital social worker that he was trusting the surgeon and nurses with his life, and that he also trusted Dave to facilitate communications needed between him and the hospital staff. Dave stayed at the hospital for 13 hours on the day of the surgery to interpret, and Rauch Interpreting Services provided round-the-clock services for Tom until his discharge from the hospital. After a complete recovery, Tom came to a Rauch Interpreting Services workshop and told everyone if there was an award for providing the best interpreting services, it should go to Rauch. He also said that if he was independently wealthy, he would hire Dave as his private interpreter, prompting chuckles from the entire group. Tom said he would only use Rauch Interpreting Services from now on... and he has!

## Jackson's Network

At 24 weeks pregnant, Kristi experienced something no mother expects - labor. When Jackson entered this world weighing less than two pounds, he was too weak to breathe or eat on his own, and needed a ventilator and a feeding tube to survive. After 128 long days in the hospital, he was finally strong enough to come home, but continued to require oxygen to breathe and a G-tube for nourishment.

At eight months old, assistance from Rauch's network of therapists was prescribed to bolster Jackson's progress. They work on skills in weekly hour-long occupational, physical, and speech therapy sessions, and his parents learned ways to support his growth during regular family time. Gradually his muscles were strengthened and coordinated so that he could eat more than a couple ounces of formula at a time, sit up on his own, hold toys, and begin babble. Jackson also attended Rauch's preschool program to supplement his therapy and increase his socialization skills.

Jackson has blossomed. At 2 1/2 years old, he laughs and smiles, and his vocabulary and abilities grow.

He is learning to jump with both feet, speak in complete sentences, complete puzzles independently, and recently had his G-tube removed. Jackson loves to "read" books, play basketball, play games on his mom's Kindle, and tumbling class. His favorite foods are hamburgers and spinach.

Kristi has learned that the therapists Rauch provides have a purpose in everything they do. Each week they come up with new ways as a team to teach Jackson skills he is struggling with. She says that thanks to that diligent support, Jackson's life has been changed. "He's able to communicate with us and do things doctors said he wouldn't be able to do." Her glowing smile and words sum up her experience: "Rauch has really been amazing."





## A Place for Bob

Bob, the youngest of four siblings, grew up in a close knit, loving family, although they weren't without their challenges. Bob's older brother Dave has Down Syndrome, and Bob has autism. When their father retired from the Air Force, the family relocated to their hometown in Southern Indiana. There, they discovered Rauch, and Bob and his brother Dave enrolled in the agency's Adult Developmental Activities (ADA) program.

In the ADA program, Bob continued to grow on his own, while Rauch staff members were vigilant in looking for ways to ensure he was comfortable, safe, and happy in our environment. As his parents aged, and his brother required out-of-home care, the family faced a new challenge - who would care for Bob when they no longer could? Bob's mother, Sue, was adamant that she would trust no provider but Rauch with her son, and he gained a place on the list of new residents scheduled to move into our Phase IV houses. After 33 years in Rauch programming, Bob was ready for a new adventure...

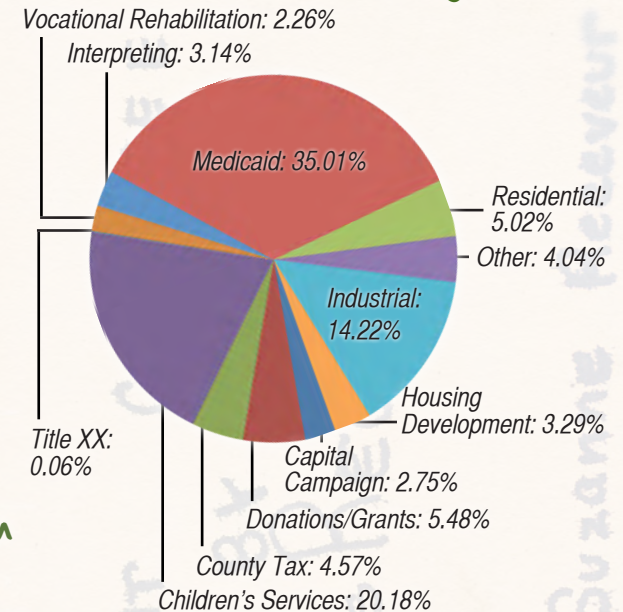

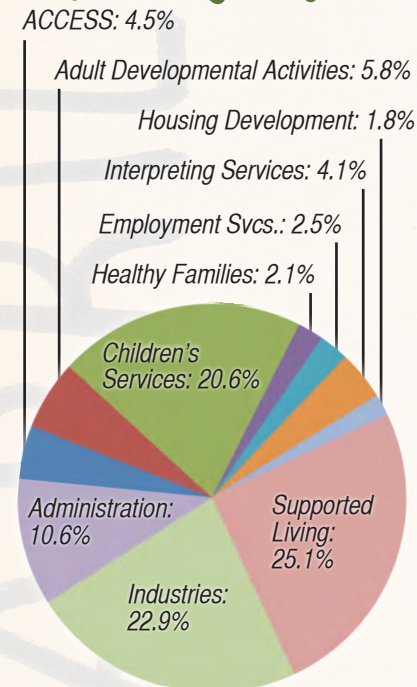

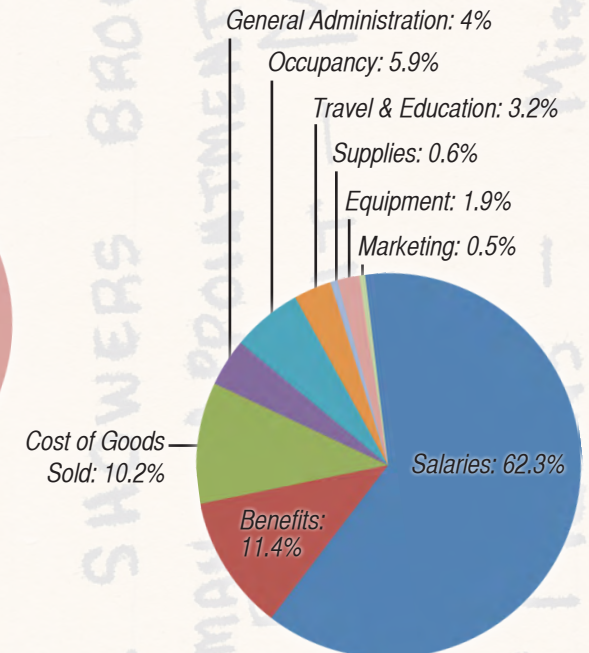
### Revenue by Source
