# The Ten Commandments of Communicating with People with Disabilities

With over 53 million Americans living with disabilities, it is increasingly important to know proper etiquette when meeting and socializing with individuals with disabilities. Knowing mannerisms that are generally accepted by those with disabilities will make you more confident in your everyday contact with individuals with all types of disabilities. The "Ten Commandments of Communicating with People with Disabilities" gives you some do's and don'ts for conversing and interacting with individuals with disabilities.

- ١. Speak directly to the person rather than through a companion or sign language interpreter.
- Offer to shake hands when introduced. People with limited hand use II. or an artificial limb can usually shake hands. Offering the left hand is an acceptable greeting.
- Always identify yourself and others who may be with you when III. meeting someone with a visual disability. When conversing in a group, remember to identify the person to whom you are speaking.
- If you offer assistance, wait until the offer is accepted, then listen IV. or ask for instructions.
- Treat adults as adults. Address people with disabilities by their first ٧. names only when extending that same familiarity to others. Never patronize people in wheelchairs by patting them on the head or shoulder.
- VI. Do not lean against or hang on someone's wheelchair. Bear in mind that people with disabilities treat their chairs as extensions of their bodies. The same is true for people with guide and assistance dogs. Never distract a work animal from their job without the owner's permission.
- VII. Listen attentively when talking with people who have difficulty speaking and wait for them to finish. Never pretend to understand; instead repeat what you have understood and allow them to respond.
- VIII. Place yourself at eye level when speaking with someone in a wheelchair or on crutches.
- IX. Tap a person who has a hearing disability on the shoulder or wave your hand to get his or her attention. Look directly at them and speak clearly, slowly, and expressively to establish if they can read your lips. If they are wearing a hearing aid, don't assume that they have the ability to discriminate your speaking voice. Never shout; just speak in a normal tone of voice.
- Χ. Relax. Don't be embarrassed if you happen to use common expressions such as "See you later" or "Did you hear about this?" that seem to relate to a person's disability.
